Campus Enhancement

At the January Congregational meeting the Church voted overwhelmingly to proceed with a reconstruction of the parking lot. The task force met on February 9 and changed its name to the Campus Enhancement Committee (CEC) to reflect the entire scope of the project. The committee will continue to be a subcommittee of the Buildings and Grounds Committee. At that meeting several critical decisions were made:

The chair is Jim Lessenger.

Greg Cox and Jim messenger will continue as the co-chairs of the B and G Committee.

Jim Lessenger is designated as the sole representative to authorized Change Orders. In his absence, Greg Cox will act in his place.

The committee authorized Dale Olm to proceed with the Cornerstone loan application. The committee authorized Jim Goring to proceed with engineering studies at a cost \$27,000. It was noted that the sewer system has disintegrated – literally – and that it will have to be rebuilt as

part of the enhancement. The extra cost will be about \$6,000 to \$10,000.

The committee will try to keep the campus operational during construction.

Laura Pyles has created a comprehensive workflow chart.

At the February 23 meeting it was announced that the 93 page Cornerstone loan application was in the mail. Dale Olm gets credit for the work he did.

Other points are:

Laura Pyles updated the workflow plan.



Jim Goring was tasked with the landscaping plan contract.

A subcommittee of Jackie Lawrence and Debbie Conway was appointed to explore parking while the parking lot is closed for construction.

It was suggested that the accounts of "capital improvements" and "parking lot repairs" be combined. Planning was started on a financing guide for members.

At the March 9 meeting it was announced that the Cornerstone Fund loan had been approved and that the loan documents needed to be signed. The retention of an attorney was authorized to write the "consul letter" that is required as part of the loan process. The consul letter is a document that guarantees to the lender that the people who have signed the documents are authorized to do so, that the church is in compliance with all nonprofit corporation laws and that the church real estate is free of liens judgments and encumbrances. Mr. Scott Reep Esq. has been retained to do that task.

The engineers and architect visited the city planning department and the church campus on Tuesday, March 11. Because we have made a proactive effort to comply with the zoning laws specifically pertaining to lighting, drainage, surfacing, retaining walls, and slope control, a conditional use permit will not be necessary and city staff can approve the designs. That will save us a tremendous amount of money and time. In addition, it looks like we will not be required to construct sidewalks along the streets.

The Committee has been in negotiations with Happy Hearts and others. It is our desire to keep the campus open during the construction process. However, we ask the indulgence of everyone who uses the campus to minimize traffic and understand the necessities of safety.

The Committee meets every other Sunday at 11:30 in the CE room.

St. Patrick St Vincent High School is coordinating housing for a group of French youth this summer for three weeks that are part of the Vistas in Education program. They will be in the Bay Area from July 10-July 31. They are in need of homes to stay in for this time.

By receiving a student as a member of your family, not just as a guest, he or she will share in all aspects of your family life. They will participate in any trips you plan for your family; accompany your children in their activities; and basically be part of your family for this time.

The French students are between the ages of 13 and 18. They have studied English for varying lengths of time. All American families are welcome to apply for this program. IT IS NOT NECESSARY TO SPEAK FRENCH since the students who come usually have a fair level of English.

There is no compensation for families who host a student, so families have to be willing and able to support another mouth to feed for the three weeks, as well as pay for movies or other family activities.

There will be an Easter egg hunt after service on Easter. Please help by bringing wrapped candy to church. Give them to Jennifer or Anna.






Easter Offerings

Sunday Worship Attendance Numbers for February, 2013

In February, Sunday morning worship attendance averaged 65 and ranged from 58 on week 4 to 70 on week 3. Year-to-date average attendance is 66 vs 72 for same period in 2013. In our first full month of tracking children in worship, we averaged15 per Sunday.

Pastor's Ponderings



I'd like to start this off with an expression of gratitude to Leslie Lessenger for volunteering to take on the Bridge. Our last publication was

April 2013, so I am glad to see it come back by April 2014! THANK YOU Leslie!

As I write this the first day of Spring has come and gone, hard to imagine since we really had no Winter to speak of, very few rain storms, virtually no major cold, so spring seems like it's early this year. I'm not ready to let go of winter. How about you? You see for me Winter is about going inward, fireplaces, comfort food, shoes, pants, short days and long nights. Growing up in the North East, Winter was cold with lots and lots of snow. I spent my days building snow forts and having snowball fights, sleighing down local hills and basically awaiting for days off because of the snow. Now that I'm a grown up I'm thinking I could use a snow day every now and then, how about you? You know a day where all your responsibilities are gone and your only requirement is to go outside in the snow or stay in and watch a movie or cartoons, and drink hot cocoa. A day of play, no extra homework, no additional tasks, just a day off. Doesn't that sound

awesome? Well I believe that "snow days" are good for our soul, a day with nothing to do.... Many people live right on the verge of exhaustion-physical, mental, emotional and spiritual exhaustion! What's the answer? For me, it was as simple as: "Take the day off!" It was a simple principle that I had been violating for years, and it finally caught up to me. Many people have a day off, but they don't take a day off! They don't take the day off mentally or emotionally; therefore, they never rest. Let's look at a few things God says about rest.

Rest is a command. It's number four on God's "Top Ten" list (Exodus 20:8–11) Not keeping the Sabbath is one of the commandments that carried the death penalty (Numbers 15:32-36; Exodus 31:14-15). And while today we don't get put to death for not observing the Sabbath, a constant stream of busyness unbroken by periods of rest does slowly kill us over time-physically, mentally, emotionally and spiritually. Rest is a blessing. Have you ever felt like you couldn't make a decision or think clearly because you were so tired? When we don't rest, we don't have the energy we need. I wonder how many creative ideas we're missing out on-for our families, for our work-because we're just too exhausted!

Exodus 31:17 says, "on the seventh day He [God] rested and was refreshed." Those words are amazing. Literally it means "to take breath." After creating the world, God stopped and "took breath." Likewise, Sabbath allows us to stop and breathe-to restart our mind, body, emotions and spirit. It's a blessing, not a burden. Is it possible you owe yourself some rest days? Is it possible if you do it, you'll reap benefits, and if you don't, you're going to reap consequences? Rest is part of God's plan for you. God doesn't want you tired. God really does want you to be able to rest. Take the day off!

Many of us would have a hard time with that, but I challenge you to take one of those days soon, just breathe in the spring, and relax in your jammies for a whole day, let the dishes wait, don't catch up on your laundry just take a break. For some this will be impossible because we have family responsibilities, but we should try even if it's just for an hour or two, as long as it's not on a Sunday morning!
