Pastor's Report

I have always wanted to start an Annual Report with quote and this year seems perfect for it... 2023 was an amazing year in so many ways. We had so many

wonderful celebrations and generosity abound and yet we also had significant loss. COVID still affected much of our population and in fact we had to close for two weeks because over 25 people in our own congregation contracted COVID while attending worship, all recovered. Fortunately, we have the technology to make Zoom only and hybrid worship possible.

A renewed sense of excitement is around every corner at Community Congregational these days during worship, there's a tangible energy that reminds us to keep going. We had many new folks join us in worship this year, as a matter of fact we took in 13 new members this year which is the largest group of new members we've taken in many years, this is a clear reflection of having Pastor Bladimer with us and the recovery from COVID. What a blessing it has been to be in ministry Pastor Bladimer this past year, this has opened the door to new ideas and possibilities. This past year we have celebrated and celebrated again, from Pastor Bladimer's installation to Filipino Independence Day to Thanksgiving Dinner, we know how to break bread together as a community and truly see one another.

In 2023 I received certification in being a death doula — also known as an end-of-life doula, end-of-life coach, death midwife or death coach — assists a dying person and their loved ones before, during and after death. An end-of-life doula provides emotional and physical support, education about the dying process, preparation for what's to come and guidance while you're grieving. This training has been invaluable as this year we have done 7 funerals, the most in one year I have ever done since I've been here.

The pandemic changed how we do church, but this church has not stopped being the church. Community Congregational members and friends are committed to love of God, love of neighbor, and providing a loving support to this community and beyond. There is nothing more moving and more celebrated than being surrounded by those who journey together in community. I hope you will smile as you see the many faces, of this community, in the photos of this report. And I hope you will celebrate the great work that has been done with love by this community. When we proudly say All Belong Here, we truly mean that. This past year has proven that again and again. I have had the privilege and the honor to welcome people into our space who have not felt welcomed in a church their entire lives or who have been faking it hoping no one notices it, CCCUCC was the first place they felt they could truly be themselves.

This year I struggled to write my annual report as it is my last one, I will retire in May of 2024 after 17 years as your Minister. This calling we have been in together has been an amazing journey and together we changed lives. I have truly been blessed to be among you all for so long. This leave taking will be hard and very unnatural for both all of us but know this, we will always be together in our hearts, for we are always connected there. Listen in the quite of your thoughts and you will hear me say, "just know you are loved, so go out and love one another."

We will continue to explore many possibilities (like Academic Scholarship and others) with these organizations to make our presence known in the wider community.



For the opportunity to look back at beautiful and well attended events like the Associate Pastor's Installation, the celebration of Philippine Independence Day, the Gospel Cantata and may others, is encouraging to say the least.

To be able to sit down with our Moderator, Deborah Shanks, and our Pastor, the Rev. Renie Kirk, on a weekly basis; to be supported by the PPRC that meets every month; to be able to attend the Dogs and Dominoes every Tuesday and build relationships; to be able to sing in the choir, I am truly grateful. Above all, I am grateful that God has brought us together in this common quest to serve one another and those who are least, lost, lonely, and vulnerable in the wider Solano Country community.

Music Ministry

The music program at Community Congregational Church continued to flourish during 2023! The Sanctuary Choir, composed of Priscilla Lane, Cholé McGraw, Deborah Shanks, Nancy Gilman, Susan Stofan, Pat Obendorf, Todd Wolf, and Andy Zinkevich (who rejoined us this year), sang on average every other week during the choir year September – May. Deborah continued to make SAB arrangements of SATB or 2-part choir anthems, giving us a wider range of repertoire. Our big project for

the year turned out to be the choir cantata *Love*, composed by Joel Raney, which comprised this year's Christmas concert, along with 2 pieces from The Rolling Tones Handbells. Liz Cleves, Lilibeth Paeste, and Rev. Bladimer Paeste joined with the choir to sing the cantata, along with 3 altos from Community Presbyterian Church in Vallejo. The cantata choir rehearsed on Thursday evenings from late August to early December, while CCC choir members also met every other Thursday afternoon to rehearse the anthems for worship services. Rev. Bladimer remained to sing with the choir through Christmas—we hope he stays!

In addition to the choir anthems, vocalists provided solos and duets for worship services, making it possible to have special music during the summer when the choir was on hiatus. Soloists included Nancy Gilman, Cholé McGraw, Deborah Shanks, Barbara Hamm, Todd Wolf and Rev. Bladimer. Liz Cleves and Marilyn Scrutchins also sang duets occasionally for gathering music and worship, accompanying themselves on guitars.

Our instrumentalists provided music for gathering and worship services virtually every Sunday of the year. Sometimes the entire ensemble played, sometimes solo instruments. Instrumentalists included Lisa Dwiggins, cello; Leslie Lessenger, flute; Shelby Riddle, clarinet and violin; Dale Olm, mandolin and percussion; Deborah Shanks, harp, piano, and organ; Barbara Hamm, piano. They also occasionally accompanied choir anthems, notably on special days such as Easter and Christmas, often using music arranged or even created by Deborah.

Something new this year was having the entire ensemble play gathering music and accompany congregational singing for memorial services, including those for Karen Burns, Greg Cox, Debbie Conway, and DeeDee McCovery (daughter of Jackie Sayles). We played Celtic music for the St. Patrick's Day fundraiser. We played Christmas orchestra music arranged by Deborah during Advent and Christmas. We were joined by trumpeter Hannah Weber, friend of Katie Stamm-Kirk, for both morning and evening services on Christmas Eve Day. Another new thing this year was the guitar class taught by Deborah during the fall on Sundays after fellowship time.

The Rolling Tones Handbell Choir also provided music, enriching worship services and special events, particularly the Christmas concert. Directed by Leslie Lessenger, the group consisted of Nancy Gilman, Deborah Shanks, Cholé McGraw, Pat Obendorf, and Kim Webb.

CCC opened its doors for the Benicia Chamber Players and the brass group Brazzissimo. Members of the Filipino community presented traditional songs and dances from their culture, including solos by Rev. Bladimer, accompanied by Rev. Edgar Avila. Rev. Avila also played the piano for gathering music on a late July Sunday.

I am grateful to each of the musicians at CCC; they make the music program what it is. I am grateful for the support of the pastors and congregation, and I continue to be deeply grateful for the opportunity to direct the music program and help create the music at CCC.

On a personal note, I was commissioned in November by the Mission Hills United Church of Christ, San Diego, to write a hymn text for the $100^{\rm th}$ anniversary celebration of its organ.

2023 proved to be a challenging year in the life of Community Congregational Church. We started by calling as Associate Pastor Bladimer Paeste and challenging ourselves with a large deficit budget. But in celebration we had a wonderful installation for him. To help with the budget, many hours were spent with our two pastors crafting language to apply for numerous grants. We applied for 5 grants: one from the NCNC, 2 from the UCC National, a Brotherhood Mutual Grant and a Lilly Endowment Religious Grant. In the end we received 3 grants: \$10,000 from the NCNC Church and Clergy Vitality Endowment and one for \$1000 from Neighbor in Need from UCC and a \$15,000 from the Casa New and Renewing Church from the UCC (which will supplement the 2024 budget) for a total of \$26,000.

As Moderator I attended and participated in the Worship Committee, Buildings and Grounds Committee, and Budget and Finance Committee. Over the year I also wrote numerous articles for the "News to the Pews" weekly online newsletter. I learned a great deal attending two "new member" classes led by Pastor Bladimer and meeting weekly with both pastors. I also attended (for the first time) the NCNC Annual Gathering in Palo Alto, along with our Minister of Music, Barbara Hamm and our Vice Moderator, Liz Cleves. We had the opportunity of leading music during the church services and during morning Taize Services.

Various money making and social events were held during the year including the Brazzissimo Concert in February, the St. Pat's Dinner and Music scheduled for March 17, but which had to be postponed to April due to an outbreak of Covid, the Filipino Independence Day Event in June and our very successful Auction in October. It should be noted that the church had to close for 2 weeks in March due to a Covid outbreak, but we re-opened on Palm Sunday and had an incredible Maundy Thursday Supper and Communion ala Filipino style (with the cracking open of a coconut) by Pastor Bladimer.

Other major events included our Loan Freedom Campaign during which time we raised \$40,000

toward our Loan. The end of year focused on Advent events: including a Cantata, "Love!" By Joel Raney, a Christmas Pageant, "The Magi Cometh", Christmas caroling to 6 member's houses (13 carolers) and playing for Faith Food Friday Christmas. But none of this could have been possible without lots and lots of help, encouragement and support by the members of our wonderful church. "Thank You" to all of you.

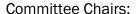

Treasurer

This has been a year of financial challenge for the church as we stepped out in faith to embrace a multicultural co-pastorship. We began the year with an anticipated deficit of \$62,582. We ended the year with an actual deficit of 21,092. We begin 2024 with a **balanced budget!** Fiscally, the church is stable. We are starting 2024 with net cash reserves of \$22,539 on December 31, 2023. Expenses averaged \$27,995 per month in 2023, so our cash reserves represent about 0.8 months of expense liability.

- Although we had passed a deficit budget for 2023, our actual deficit was \$41,492 less than anticipated.
- We actually received 109% of pledges to Operations and Ministries and 94% of pledges to the Capital Improvement/Loan Payment Fund. Contributions from non-pledging parishioners also exceeded our expectations. Our congregation is awesome and generous!
- Parking Lot/Campus Loan: From both our regular loan payments and additional loan reduction contributions, our loan principal has been reduced by \$84,204. Our outstanding principal on the parking lot/campus renovation (parking lot resurfacing, hillside retaining walls, landscaping, sewer line & drainage replacement) loan is currently \$50,908, down \$299,092 from an original loan of \$350,000 in 2015. At the current pledge level for the Capital Improvements/Loan payoff pledges, the loan should be paid off by September 2026.
- Due to the amount of funds held in CDs in the Cornerstone Fund by our church and by members of the congregation, we continue to receive a 1% reduction in our loan interest.
- The Financial Secretary report shows that more funds were received by the church than is indicated in the revenue reported in the Treasurer report. This is due to funds received which were not included in budgetary operating revenue and which instead went into restricted committee and program accounts. This was also due to receiving pledged funds in 2023 designated for 2024.
- The Bookkeepers, a professional bookkeeping service in Vallejo, has continued to enter financial data and maintain accounts in Quickbooks. The Treasurer continues to prepare financial reports, pay bills, manage insurance and the pension plan, and oversee the budget. The Treasurer also continues to prepare and report payroll data to MinistryWorks, our payroll company.
- The Budget and Finance Committee (Liz Cleves, Nancy Gilman, Leslie Lessenger, Dale Olm, Shelby Riddle, Deborah Shanks, Nora Gauger, Rev. Renie Stamm-Kirk, Rev. Bladimer Paeste) met monthly to
 - review the budget, revenue, and expenses. The committee prepared the 2024 budget to be presented at the congregational meeting in January for approval. This, too, will be a year in transition for the church as our pastor of 17 years, Rev. Renie Kirk, retires and we begin the search and calling of a new co-pastor.

Building and Grounds Committee Report - 2023

The Committee was very active and productive during 2023. The members of the committee were Dale Olm and Shelby Riddle (Co-chairs), Nancy Gilman, Jim Lessenger, Leslie Lessenger, Deborah Shanks and Liz Cleves. Rev. Renie Kirk & Rev. Bladimer Paeste participated in committee meetings. Chole McGraw and Todd Wolf were project managers for specific gardening and landscaping projects. Jim Lessenger was our archivist and maintained the church archives. Nancy Gilman maintained our housekeeping & janitorial supplies and Liz Cleves assumed. Deb Shanks was our liaison with our custodians.

Thanks to our many additional volunteers throughout the year.

Projects and repairs completed in 2023

- Christmas lights were strung on the Labyrinth rosemary, Peace pole and bushes at the street front of the church.
- Re-mulching the hillside between the CE Building and the sanctuary (Todd Wolf spearheaded this).
- Leslie Lessenger created composting and recycling dioramas to help people sort Fellowship waste.
- Drainage on the north side of the CE Building was repaired and improved to prevent flooding of the classrooms and playground. Additional improvements are scheduled for 2024.
- The underground gutter drainage conduit was repaired and cleaned out on the south side of the CE Building to divert rainwater off the hillside and help prevent flooding of the organ pit.
- An area of the flat roof over the organ pit was resealed to fix the roof leak.
- The southside eavestrough was resealed to extend its life.
- The outside faucet by the furnace room was replaced after the existing faucet snapped off from corrosion.
- The plexiglass covering of the Good Shepherd window was re-afixed.
- Two additional Ring security cameras were installed outside the patio and labyrinth.
- An additional wifi router and wifi extenders were installed in the sanctuary to improve wifi signal to the Ring cameras and guests.
- A Knoxbox was installed to allow fire department access in case of emergency.
- The plumbing of the irrigation manifold on the northwest corner of the CE Building was damaged by someone jumping on it causing flooding of the CE kitchen. It was repaired by Wayne Plumbing and our gardener. Protective, decorative coverings (child friendly) were designed and built by Jim Lessenger and Leslie Lessenger to protect the manifolds on the CE Building from future damage.
- Genesis House stopped providing monthly landscaping services early in the year. A new gardener was
 hired to provide weed control and pruning of the church property periphery outside the border of the
 parking lot and driveways. He also provides the same service for Playing to Learn Childcare (who
 contributes to his monthly fees). Church volunteers continue to maintain the inner area of the church
 property.
- The Mexican fan palm was removed by C&W Tree Service to prevent damage to the neighbor's roof. The Italian/Monterrey Cypress trees that were starting to lean were removed by De Rosas Tree care.
- The palm tree on the corner of West 2nd Street and 0 street was removed by PGE to prevent damage to overhead wires.

- The shed was blocking the neighbor's view of the straits and hillsides. It was moved (rolled) to a new location in the parking lot.
- The solar parking lot light in the upper driveway was replaced by Butler Electric.
- The marquis sign at the street corner of the lower driveway was removed to allow repair and renovation of the sign.
- The kitchen sink faucet/sprayer was replaced.
- The audiovisual & Zoom streaming system in the sanctuary was upgraded with new equipment and causes associated with poor streaming audio quality were troubleshooted and resolved.
- The new "All Belong Here" banner was hung on the sanctuary frontage facing West 2nd Street.
- "Children at Play" and "Smile, You're on Camera" signs were posted on the driveway and shed.

On-going routine maintenance:

- Weed whacking, pruning, palm tree sprout removal, spreading wood chip mulch; wildfire weed control
- Restocking paper, trash bags and cleaning supplies; monitoring of custodial services; cleaning the kitchen/refrigerator; dusting and cobweb removal; cleaning chairs in Fellowship and sanctuary; window cleaning; vacuuming the Sunday School room
- Light bulb and smoke alarm battery changes as needed
- Replacement of the flutter flag when faded (twice a year)
- Quarterly furnace MERV 11 filter replacement in the sanctuary furnace and CE building furnaces
- Monthly B&G workdays for landscaping and building maintenance
- Inspection and repairs to the underground drip irrigation system as needed
- Campus litter, garbage (and other) patrol
- Application of vinegar spray (15% vinegar, Dawn, Epson salts) for weed control in the patio, retaining
 walls, rocks and labyrinth areas to control weeds. It is non-toxic. It is not a systemic poison, so touchup reapplication is required (Fall & Spring)
- Repairs to the old, original retaining walls along the driveway and street
- Repairs as needed to infrastructure of the church buildings

Projects in progress:

- Maintenance of the native plant garden on the upper hillside facing 2nd Street, outside the PTL fence. (designed and planted by Chole McGraw).
- Location and capping of the leak in the labyrinth irrigation zone.
- Revisions of the facility use policies, insurance requirements, and the hold harmless statement are in progress.
- Our gardener has been retained to repair the labyrinth.
- · Repair and renovation of the "tombstone" marquee sign

Future projects (2024 and beyond) not yet scheduled:

- Future, major projects not yet scheduled include replacement and extension of rain gutters & downspouts, repair and renovation of the original parts of the irrigation system, resealing/maintenance of the parking lot surface (~2027), roof replacement (~2032). Roof maintenance (resealing, cleaning, leak repairs); the retaining wall on West 2nd Street is slowly deteriorating at some point it will fail and will need to be replaced (date unknown).
- Dry rot repair of the CE Building.
- Re-painting the portico outside Fellowship Hall
- Mulching of the hillside between the CE Building and the Sanctuary
- Preparation of a photographic archive of the Green membership book

- Evaluation & replacement of the underground gutter drainage system on the north side of the CE Building
- Replace the smaller TV monitor in the sanctuary with larger screen; install audio monitor in instrumental area; re-configure Zoom cameras for new video streaming angle; review sound system

Although Welcome and Growth has a number of responsibilities for our church, I have come to believe the most important one is that of being there to greet not just our guests, but all our familiar attendees too—and (isn't it nice?) it is the most fun one too!! There is nothing quite as uplifting on a Sunday morning as to stand there by the name labels and be smiled at by friends and strangers alike and to hear the news from familiar faces and learn from the new ones.

All the same, Welcome and Growth has done a bit more than smile for and with the church this year:

- Throughout the year, we have kept track of the attendance numbers for our worship services, dividing attendance by category actual attendance and Zoom. It is interesting to note that generally, 1/5th to 1/3rd of our attendance was on Zoom as members traveling, housebound or just ducking the weather were still able to worship with us.
- We have provided name labels for all regular attendees. Everyone doesn't always wear them, but our people are great at welcoming guests and are careful to don their labels when I remind them, we have visitors.
- Whenever possible—and it most often is possible—we have gotten the information from visitors that allows us to enroll them in *News from the Pews* and send them a note welcoming them.
- Although we no longer require vaccination information before anyone can attend, we have provided masks for those who want them and guests particularly have availed themselves of the service.
- As they occur, we have advertised on the Bulletin Board the various outreach events the church has put on (Christmas concert, Thanksgiving potluck, Easter Egg Hunt etc.) and posted pictures afterwards on the same bulletin board to maximize congregational support and participation.
- In March we had to close the church for two weeks because of Covid. We had over 30 people on zoom for each week we were close.
 - We have no January and November numbers as Mission and Outreach was out of the office.

Christian Education

Children go up to the Sunday School room after the Children's Story Sermon in the Worship Service. Currently we are a "One-room Sunday School" for all ages from preschool up to middle school. Our childcare provider, Parand Banagar, assists the teacher(s) with lessons and the pre-school children. There are always at least 2 adults present.

Attendance varied from 0 to 9, typically 2 to 4 children, with an average of 2.3. Nineteen different children attended during the year of which 5 children attended regularly, ages 2 to 8 years.

Lessons were created from Children's Worship Bulletins (https://www.childrensbulletins.com), The Family Story Bible (Milton), The Lectionary Story Bible (Milton), Growing in God's Love – a Story Bible (Caldwell & Wehrheim), the Complete Children's Liturgy Book (Thompson) and Rfour.com, as well as other books and websites.

During the pandemic closure we emailed at-home lessons and activities to parents and grandparents each week. This was discontinued early this year since we had in-person Sunday School and there was a lack of interest in the emails.

Thank you to adult volunteers Nancy Aldritt, Liz Cleves, Nancy Gilman, Jim Lessenger, Adam Olm, Dale Olm and Marilyn Scrutchins for their assistance in Sunday School and childcare. The Council chair remained open during the 2023 year.

Compliance with the new California law, AB506 for child abuse prevention in youth organizations, is in progress and will continue through 2024. Seminars have been attended and we have subscribed to Church HR Network to assist in setting up LiveScreen background testing and mandated reported training for staff and volunteers.

Mission and Outreach

With the faithful support of our entire congregation, this year our church took on the following missions:

On February 6, 2023, we first met as a committee and authorized from the 5% of pledges this church dedicates to Mission \$5,000 to OCWM, and \$400 each to One Great Hour of Sharing, Neighbors in Need and Strengthen the Church—all funds our denomination has created to support Mission throughout the world.

In March, as a result of two unfortunate incidents of people unconnected with the church demanding attention of our ministers during service for what turned out to be false claims of need, our



committee developed an Action Plan so that committee members could respond rather than our ministers. We created information sheets with contacts to local services so that we could refer any requests to the local organizations with housing and emergency help. In addition, we stocked a cupboard in the Fellowship Hall with food staples so no one would go away hungry.

Also in March, we responded to the earthquake in Turkey and Syria be donating \$500 using our denomination which was already hard at work in the area. Members of the congregation added their own money so that the total we sent was \$850!



At Easter, our congregation filled the altar area with

not the usual Lilies, but with Starter Kits (mops, cleaning supplies, towels, pot and pans, etc.) for aged-out foster youth being installed in their first apartments by First Place for Youth, a local non-profit who

assists foster youth to transition to independence safely and with meaningful job and financial skills. Sadly, in May, we had to discontinue our monthly bag lunches for the Homeless because *Vallejo Together*, the organization that was in charge to distributing the lunches to the various Homeless Camps in and around Vallejo, had to pause services until they were able to correct some deficiencies in their 501C3 requirements.



June saw the M&O committee concentrating on our summer Mission, providing filled backpacks to low-income kindergarteners at Stefan Manor Elementary in Vallejo for the start of the 2023 School year. We purchased 30 backpacks, and our congregation signed up for and then provided all the school supplies to provision them! Together we loaded each of the backpacks with all the necessary supplies on a Sunday in July, and took them to be distributed at the beginning of school.

This September, we collected \$1150 to send through the UCC to Maui to help with the aftermath of their disastrous fire—that is \$500 sent from the general mission money (funded by the 5% of pledges allocated for mission giving) plus \$650 from various members of the congregation who added their own donations to what the church is giving. Thanks to our generous congregation!

October saw us taking on another emergency—the humanitarian crisis in Israel/Gaza. Because the UCC was restricted from access to much of the area, the M&O decided to steer our donation of \$400 through two very highly rated non-profits who have specifically stated that their participation will be all directed to the humanitarian needs and take no part in the political conflict: *Doctors without Borders* who are working to keep hospitals supplied and able to treat the wounded, and *World Central Kitchen* who do take-away meals in not just Gaza and Israel, but in the neighboring areas where those displaced have fled.

In November, we conducted a "Gently Used Coats and Jackets" drive to collect nice warm and waterproof outdoor wear to donate to our homeless friends on the street, as well as providing 20 lb. turkeys for the annual Thanksgiving Feast for the Homeless at 1st Baptist church in Vallejo. It took the combined help of Nancy, Rev. Renie, and Vallerie Thomas and her husband Adam to transport and deliver our 25 turkeys, but our valent crew delivered them safely, ready to be roasted and eaten on Thanksgiving Day!

December is always a busy month for Mission and



Outreach. This year, Nancy Gillman, our co-chair, worked with our congregation to provide gifts and gift cards to help low-income Benicia families have a Christmas with their families through *Benicia Family Resource Center*, our local non-profit. All the gift sign-ups were filled and Nancy also was given a number of gift cards from the congregation for gas and groceries.

Once again, as we have done for a number of years, our church decorates our altar area for Christmas not with Poinsettias but with new underwear, tarps, sleeping bags, etc. for the Homeless. This year, as always, our generous congregation donates "in memory" or "in honor of" someone of their choice and the whole front of the church is overflowing with so-needed winter warmth for our friends on the street.

A special thanks should go to all those on the M&O committee, allowing us as a church to serve those most in need as Jesus asked us to do: Kathy Berry, Karen Burns, Lisa Dwiggins, Leslie Lessenger, Chole McGraw, Carlos Medina, Billie Jo Munds, and Michelle Padilla.

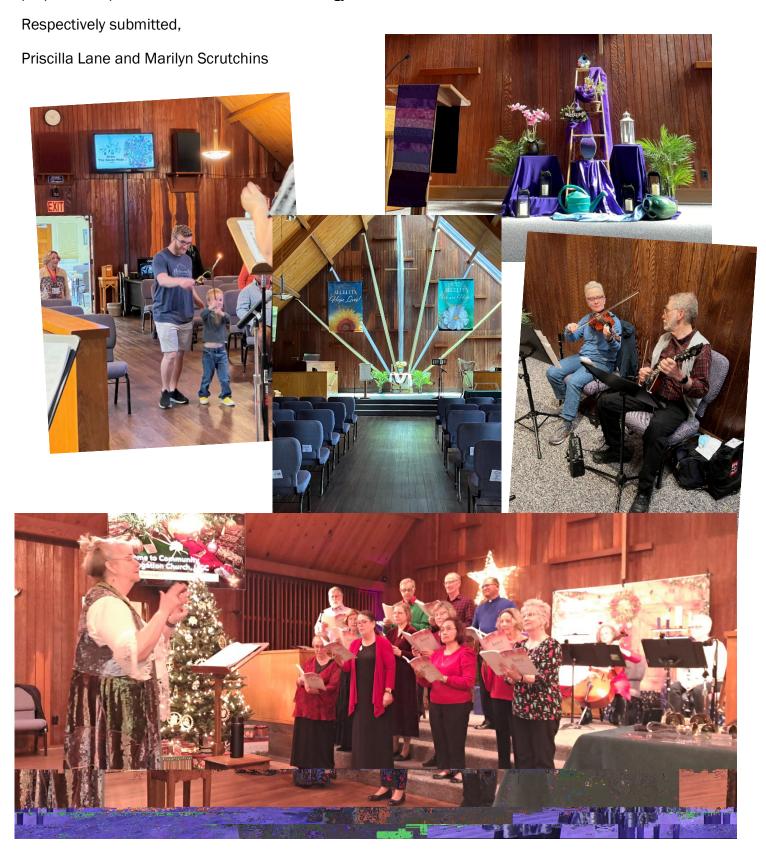

Many thanks to all who helped bring food and cleaning the kitchen. Too many to name.

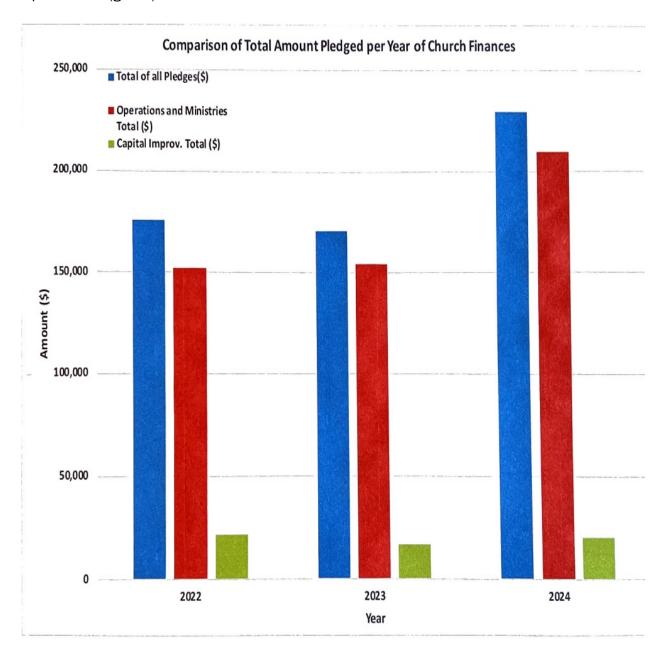


Stewardship
