## Co-Pastor's Report - Rev. Renie Kirk

This is the last annual report for Rev. Renie Kirk who served as our pastor for 17 years and retired on May 19, 2024. This report represents a summary of her last five months, but in many ways represents her contributions for the last 17 years. During 2024, Rev. Renie stepped back from acting as Sr. Pastor, to Co-Pastor with Rev. Bladimer Paeste. This allowed for a transition while we began our search for a new co-pastor.

Here are some of the highlights: Attendance at regular activities included Dogs and Dominoes, Game Night and regular meetings with co-pastor Rev. Bladimer and the Moderator; as well as meeting with new visitors, members and those in the community, including continued work with the Bay Association. Technical accomplishments that enhanced the church included updating numerous web pages, adding a New Directory, and working on resolving issues with Zoom and the video/sound system.

She spear-headed our Lenten season with the theme, UP, from the movie. We had a movie & popcorn night on Ash Wednesday (which was also Valentine's Day) to watch UP and discuss it. We decorated the sanctuary with hot air balloons and then she thematically preached on various concepts of being UP. This culminated with a great Easter!

Her retirement service and party were held on May 19, 2024 during which time we presented her with the status of "Minister Emerita" having been unanimously voted such by the congregation in recognition of her 17 years of full-time ministry (one of the longest) in our church's recent history.

The following are her remarks from her last Council meeting: "This is my final report and my final council. You are the finest people one could ever imagine doing ministry with. The thing you need to remember is that you will always be a part of me and I will always be a part of you. Thank you for all of your patience, kindness, mercy, grace, generosity and love that you have shown me! You are a great group of people and I wish you all the best in this new season that you are about to begin. May you continue to grow in faith, mind, body and soul and remember to do everything for the glory of God!"









### Co-Pastor - Rev. Bladimer Paeste

The year 2024 was a year of transition, celebration, and opportunities. We granted the Rev. Renie Kirk the title of Pastor Emerita of the church. We also celebrated Rev. Renie's retirement in May 2024 for having served CCCUCC for more than 17 years. As I was given the opportunity to temporarily assume the fulltime pastoral responsibility from May 2024 to October 15, 2024 while the church was in transition and in the process of calling the Rev. Kim Kendrick. We are blessed that the Rev. Kim Kendrick said yes to CCCUCC's call as Co-pastor and the congregation acted and celebrated her welcome on October 13, 2024. Sincere gratitude to the Pastoral Search Committee who worked diligently and tirelessly during the call process.

2024 has been an exciting year as CCCUCC embraced the co-pastor leadership model. Added to it is the welcoming of two pastors of color working as a team and co-equal. This is unprecedented and something the CCCUCC community should celebrate and be proud of.

CCCUCC is blessed to be able to help, support, and assist our folks who are food insecure. Through the Pastor' discretionary fund, we were able to give gift cards and gas cards to our folks in need. Thanks to the generosity of those who donated monies for the pastor's discretionary fund.

We lost two of our beloved church members Ed Dieden (February 21, 2024) and Darlene Peterson (Nov. 25, 2024). Both of them blessed our CCCUCC community with their gentle presence, generosity, and love. We celebrate all that they were and we will keep them in our hearts.

I had opportunities to celebrate lives and conduct a memorial service (July 29, 2024, Arsenio "Jun" Capulong) and inurnment (July 20, 2024, Christopher Andrew Fleming, July 20, 2024) of folks beyond our CCCUCC community. These events help in spreading the news about our welcoming church family. This ministry will continue in 2025.

There are a number of church folks who sat down with me to break bread. These fellowships, lunch or dinner, are pastoral in nature or simply checking in or getting to know each other in a deeper way. These meetings help build and nurture relationships and also opportunities for me to hear feedback, suggestions, and hopes for the church.

Our nurturing opportunities have grown. We have the Listening, Study, and Prayer group for Filipino folks every  $2^{nd}$  and  $4^{th}$  Wednesday of the month. Starting January 15, 2025, we will venture into a comprehensive study of the Bible.

We have grown as a community in 2024 in terms of number. We conducted two (2) New Member's classes, and we have 8 folks in total attendance and all of them were received or enlisted as new members of CCCUCC. There are about 30 individuals, both children and adults, who have attended church regularly or irregularly. Some of them indicated interest in joining our community while others simply come, get involved, but have not decided to become members yet. Co-Pastor will continue to encourage folks to become official members. Obviously, it is a concerted effort because providing hospitality and a sense of home for everyone who walks into our community is everybody's business.

There has been obvious excitement in our midst. There are new folks in our community. There are new things happening. We will continue to stay in this momentum as we journey on to 2025. I call on every member of the church to joyfully share their gifts, time, talents, and treasures. Let us be one in our quest

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## Search and Call Committee Report

- The Search & Call Committee was organized on January 31, 2024 in anticipation of the retirement of Pastor Renie Kirk.
- The committee met regularly, usually once a week to prepare our Church Profile and Position Posting statement using the following:
  - The current Constitution and Bylaws, especially the mission statement and membership requirements
  - o The Website
  - The Congregational Survey for a New Settled Co-pastor that was prepared by the Transition Team in December 2023.
  - o A demographics survey of the congregation prepared by the committee
  - o The Marks of Faithful & Effective Authorized Ministry (UCC)
  - The previous church profile prepared in 2006
  - o Annual reports (financial & membership)
  - o Introducing the New Local Church Profile
- Profiles of candidates for our search for a settled 50% co-pastor were received and evaluated. A
  short questionnaire was sent out to candidates for written responses. References and "subreferences" were called. Where possible, recordings of sermons and worship services by candidates
  on YouTube and elsewhere were watched. In-person interviews by the committee of the top two
  candidates were completed. Committee members attended a "neutral pulpit" to observe our final
  candidate "in action" preaching and leading worship.
- The Search & Call Committee concluded their mission to search for a candidate for the position of 50% co-pastor with Pastor Bladimer.
- The Rev. Kimberly Kendrick (Pastor Kim) accepted our offer of call for this settled position.
- Her Letter of Call was approved at the September Council meeting.
- An open house was held on Saturday October 12, 2024, for congregants to meet Pastor Kim.
- Pastor Kim led the worship service on October 13. At the congregational meeting following the service, attending members (plus those on Zoom) voted unanimously to call Rev. Kimberly Kendrick as our new, settled co-pastor (50%).
- I would like to thank the committee of 12 and our counselor, Pastor Bladimer Paeste, for their diligence, cooperation, spirit of consensus and hard work since January 31, 2024 on this mission. It has been an honor to have served as their chairperson.

## **Music Ministry**

Music plays an integral role in the life of Community Congregational Church, and the musicians were kept quite busy in 202024. The Sanctuary Choir was comprised of Cholé McGraw, Priscilla Lane, Deborah Shanks, Nancy Gilman, Susan Stofan, Pat Obendorf, Todd Wolf, Andy Zinkevich, Rev. Bladimer Paeste, and Lisa Dwiggins, who began singing with the choir in the fall. The choir sang on average every other Sunday and had a varied repertoire, some of which was

adapted by Deborah Shanks from 4-part to 3-part music, often with instrumental accompaniments.

We really pulled out all the stops in the spring, singing a couple of Rev. Renie Kirk's favorite anthems, one of them a lively gospel Easter anthem and another on May 19 for her last worship service with CCC. We also sang a moving piece called "Friends" at her retirement party that same day.

The choir performed some challenging pieces during Advent and Christmas, among them "Christmas Is Coming" and Gloria in Excelsis Deo." At a time when fewer churches have choirs that regularly rehearse and sing, our small but mighty group of volunteers still rehearses weekly and sings regularly throughout the choir year, September through May.

Several vocal soloists also provided special music for worship services and/or the annual Christmas Concert: Mary Susan Gast, Nancy Gilman, Cholé McGraw, Rev. Bladimer Paeste, Deborah Shanks, Todd Wolf, and Barbara Hamm. Liz Cleves and Marilyn Scrutchins also occasionally played guitars and sang for gathering music and/or special music during a service. Our children do not sing regularly, but Jessie and Avery Aldritt-Goad, Ayaan Patiram De La Roz, Jack Olsen, and Dylan and Aiden Stanger practiced after church to learn "Away in a Manger" for the Christmas Concert. Dale Olm also worked with them during Sunday School and led them when they performed – to loud applause.

An Instrumental Ensemble consisting of Leslie Lessenger on flute, Shelby Riddle on clarinet, Lisa Dwiggins on cello, Deborah Shanks on harp, Dale Olm on mandolin (and sometimes percussion), and Barbara Hamm on piano provided music for gathering/worship most Sundays of the year as well as occasionally accompanying choir anthems. They sometimes performed as soloists (all of them!), as duos (Lisa/Deborah; Lisa/Leslie; Leslie/Deborah; Shelby/Dale; Shelby/Barbara) or a trio (Leslie/Lisa/Deborah) at various times. A small church like ours is fortunate to have such a skilled cadre of musicians, and I do not take them for granted! Barbara and Shelby also played jazz Christmas carols for the Vallejo Disciples of Christ Global Faire in December.

Another instrumental group, The Rolling Tones Handbell Choir, directed by Leslie Lessenger, is comprised of Nancy Gilman, Cholé Mcgraw, Pat Obendorf, Deborah Shanks, and Kim Webb. Leslie chooses all the music and trains newcomers who wish to learn to play handbells. They performed for worship services and for the Christmas Concert, adding inspiration and beauty to the musical life of CCC. They also performed in December at an event in Fairfield for North Bay Hospice and Bereavement.

We offered a well-attended Taizé service on Good Friday, accompanied by the Instrumental Ensemble. The positive response encouraged us to offer 3 more Taizé services on June 21, October 4, and December 31 (New Year's Eve!).

This year marked the 20<sup>th</sup> year of CCC's Concert Series, which began in 2004. Our concerts this year included the Dultones, self-described as the "only all male, all Chinese Doo Wop group you will ever google," performing hits from the 50's and 60's at our Chinese New Year's dinner; the 10-piece brass chamber music ensemble Brazzissimo; and our own annual Homegrown Christmas Concert. The Benicia Chamber Players also continued their series of Sunday afternoon concerts.

My position includes a fair share of behind-the-scenes work: selecting music, practicing, rehearsing with individuals and groups, typing lyrics, proofreading bulletins and slides, writing reports, reporting copyrighted song usage to our 2 copyright licensing agencies, CCLI and One License—all of it in the service of making the music happen. I am blessed to work with all our dedicated singers and instrumentalists, grateful for their willingness to use their gifts in music ministry at CCC.

#### Moderator

#### Dr. Elizabeth Cleves

2025 was a challenging year in the life of Community Congregational Church. As new Moderator, I began the year as our church was in the process of preparing a heartfelt farewell to our pastor of 17 years, Pastor Emerita Renie Kirk. The first half of the year was busy, hectic at times, and on occasion, quite challenging for me as a first time Council member.

In January we welcomed a few new members into the church leadership. With the help of our dedicated Worship Committee we packed up Christmas 2023, finalized our budget for 2024 and began the new year. Our special *Transition Team* made recommendations for a new Co-Pastor, and we also began work on a new *Release of Call* for Rev. Renie.

From January until the end of August, I attended meetings and participated in the work of the Building and Grounds Committee, the Budget and Finance Committee and participated in several events throughout the year. I also wrote a few articles for our weekly online newsletter "News From the Pews".

February was an especially busy month. With my catering skills, I was involved in our lovely Valentines Day event featuring not only dinner, but a special showing of the film "Up" in the church sanctuary. At the end of the month we ushered in the Year of the Dragon for a Chinese New Year celebration complete with entertainment and song from the fabulous Do-Wop group *The DulTones*.

Each month I met weekly with Pastor Renie and after her departure, I met with Pastor Blademir to discuss church activities, timelines and various projects for the church. During the *Children's Time* portion of our church service each Sunday I happily facilitated by teaching the children about the scripture we focused on each Sunday . When needed, and with the help of Marilyn Scrutchins, I also provided gathering music with song and guitar.

Various money making and social events were held during the first six months of the year including the *Brazzissimo* Concert, the St. Patrick's Day Dinner, and ticketed raffles during events. During the Lenten season we continued our tradition of donating funds for 'Lilies' that would go to help teens who were aging-out of the foster system. We continued our traditional Maundy Thursday Simple Super, Good Friday Taize Service and Easter Egg Hunt for the children of our church. Pastor Renie's Retirement Party at the end of May was a great success.

June included our annual Philippine Independence Day Celebration that was attended by many church members (and some who were not members!) and at the end of the month, I also facilitated a Leadership Retreat for council members.

In July we assembled an outdoor July 4<sup>th</sup> *Ice Cream Social* for church and community members. At the end of July and with the talents of Deb Shanks on piano, Nancy Gilman, Chole and Todd Wolf we performed a special puppet show to the song "So Long, Farewell" from the Sound of Music to bid farewell to our lovely childcare staff member Parand as she left for college in Chicago.

In August, we held a *New Members* class with Pastor Baldimier that was offered to people who were interested in becoming members of the church.

At the end of August, I learned that I had developed serious health concerns that were strongly affected by stress. I had tried my best to sustain a demanding full-time job and perform my duties as Moderator. So, on the advice of my primary doctor, on September 1, I had to step down from my role as Moderator. Thankfully, our Vice Moderator Shelby Riddle gracefully and graciously stepped up to finish the year in my place. To all the people who provided direction, encouragement and sincere friendship along the way my heart says, "Thank you!"

I started the year as Vice-Moderator but took over the Moderator position from Liz Cleaves about the time that Pastor Kim joined CCC. It has been an interesting year. #### Treasurer

- 2024 Budget: We began the 2024 fiscal year with a balanced budget. Unfortunately, we ended the year with a deficit of -\$30,342, due to unexpected wind damage to our trees and solar parking lights, City of Benicia required tree trimming along M Street, increased cost of utilities, a delay in grant dispersal, and accumulated backpay to retired staff.
- **Grants:** We had anticipated receiving \$17,500 in grants (\$15,000 from the UCC and \$2,500 from the Bay Association). However, due to delays in the funding agencies, we only received \$9,754 in 2024. The remainder is expected in 2025.
- 2024 Financial Status: Budget deficits influence our unrestricted cash reserves which were -\$13,253 at the end of December. Cash flow is not a problem at this time since we have \$81,838 total in our bank accounts. Most of these funds are in restricted accounts.
- 2024 Pledges: We actually received 100% of 2024 pledged revenue to Operations and Ministries and 117% of pledges to the Capital Improvement/Loan Payment Fund despite the need for some pledgers to reduce their contributions. Contributions from non-pledging parishioners also exceeded our expectations. Our congregation is awesome and generous! All pledges to the Capital Improvement Fund go into a restricted fund for major renovations and improvements and are not used for regular operating expenses.
- Parking Lot/Campus Loan: Although we anticipated paying off the parking lot loan early (in September of 2026) due to an accumulation of bequests, fund raisers and additional individual donations, we were able to pay off the loan with a generous personal donation in January of this year. The original payoff date on this 30-year \$350,000 loan was in 2045. Not only does this save significant interest expense, but it also allows us to start rebuilding our Capital Improvement Fund for future renovation and major repairs (i.e., new roof, painting the buildings, etc.).
- The Bookkeepers, a professional bookkeeping service in Vallejo, has continued to enter financial data and maintain accounts in Quickbooks. The Treasurer continues to prepare financial reports, pay bills, manage insurance (UCCIB), manage the pension plan (UCCPB), and oversee the budget. The Treasurer also continues to prepare and report payroll data to MinistryWorks, our payroll company.
- The Budget and Finance Committee (Liz Cleves, Leslie Lessenger, Dale Olm, Shelby Riddle, Deborah Shanks, Rev. Renie Kirk (before retirement), Rev. Bladimer Paeste and Rev. Kimberly Kendrick) plus guests met monthly to review the budget, revenue, and expenses. The committee meetings are open and anyone interested is welcome to attend.
- 2025 Budget: The committee prepared the 2025 budget to be presented at the congregational
  meeting in January for approval. Currently, we are anticipating a deficit of -\$15,437 in 2025, so we are
  slowly reducing our yearly deficit and increasing our unrestricted cash reserves.
  - o Anticipated revenue for 2025 is \$12,580 less than budgeted in 2024.
  - o Anticipated expenses for 2025 is \$2,857 less than budgeted in 2024.
  - Although pledges to operations and ministries are down \$3,350 from 2024, we had anticipated a decease of about \$25,000 in pledges from former congregants moving away, transferring membership, etc.

## **Building and Grounds**

Dale Olm and Shelby Riddle - Co-Chairs

The Committee was very active and productive during 2024. The members of the committee were Dale Olm and Shelby Riddle (Co-chairs), Jim Lessenger, Leslie Lessenger, Deborah Shanks and Liz Cleves. Rev. Renie Kirk & Rev. Bladimer Paeste participated in committee meetings. Chole McGraw and Todd Wolf were project managers for specific gardening and landscaping projects. Jim Lessenger was our archivist and maintained the church archives. Leslie Lessenger, Jim Lessenger and Deb Shanks were project managers for our structural projects and building use by outside groups. Nancy Gilman maintained our housekeeping & janitorial supplies. Thanks to Nora Gauger, Jaden Bleasdale, Barbara Hamm, Pastor Bladimer Paeste, Patrick Munds and Roger Reaber for their regular contributions to the upkeep & repair of grounds and buildings.

Thanks to our many additional volunteers throughout the year.

Projects and repairs completed in 2024

- Christmas lights were strung on the Labyrinth rosemary bushes, the Peace pole and the bushes at the front of the church.
- Mulching Mania Event: the hillsides and the recycling/garbage area
- Roof: An area where the flat roof over the offices joined with the roof over Fellowship Hall was resealed to fix the roof leak.
  - o The southside eavestrough was vacuumed and cracks resealed to extend its life.
  - A new restricted Fund called the "Holey Roof Fund" was set up. \$1,430 will be set aside from the Capital Improvement Fund in anticipation of needing \$120,000 in 2032 for roof replacement.
  - Three of the gutter downspouts on the sanctuary building were removed, unclogged of roof gravel and a shuttle cock, corroded & leaking areas sealed over with gutter tape and reinstalled.
- Trees: C&W Tree Service was called in to remove wind damage to the pepperwood tree by the bell. Later in the year, they pruned and trimmed pepperwood trees overhanging M Street. PGE removed the palm tree endangering overhead wires on the corner of West 2<sup>nd</sup> and M streets.
- Parking Lot: The solar parking lot luminaries were all inspected and tightened in the parking lot by Butler Electric. One of the globes fell in a windstorm and was damaged beyond repair. A replacement was installed by Butler Electric.
- Signage: The marquee sign at the end of the main driveway was taken down, refinished and reinstalled. Leslie Lessenger designed and made a stained-glass panel to replace the old UCC panel.
  - A lightweight, printed sign (by Office Max) was used to replace the hanging letters sign in the Marque. The hanging letters sign was heavy. The printed sign will be easier to update and provides a more modern look.
- **Portico:** Fascia and trim were removed from the west facing side of the Fellowship Hall portico to assess dry rot. Extensive deterioration was found. Contractors were consulted about replacing the beams. It was decided to wait until 2025 to attempt repair and reinforcement of the current structure.
- Doors: The locking mechanism for the Fellowship Hall double doors failed and could not be repaired.
  Replacing the doors with new doors and hardware proved to be cost inhibitive due to the size of the
  doors and the need to have them custom-fabricated. The doors were removed and are in the process
  of being repaired and refinished. Early in 2025 they will be re-installed and Concord Locksmith will
  install new hardware and mechanisms. After the doors were removed temporary, plywood doors were
  installed by Jim Lessenger, Dale Olm and Adam Olm.

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- Keypad door locks were installed on outside doors to the office, the Pastors' office and the outside choir room door.
- o The doors to the pastors' office were trimmed to resolve sticking and were refinished.
- Gardening: Native Plant Garden Two retaining walls were installed on the native plant garden slope facing West 2<sup>nd</sup> Street. The upper area was levelled and covered with weed cloth and wood chip mulch.
  - Our gardener was retained to rebuild the paver path in front of the CE Building with decomposed granite. The pavers were reused to expand the paver path between the 2<sup>nd</sup> level of the parking lot and the patio staircase.
  - o Our gardener was retained to reset & repair the labyrinth surface and borders.
- CE Building: Three aged thermostats were replaced in the CE Building.
  - o 3 electrical outlets in the CE Building were repaired.
  - o The outside door to the CE Building was repainted.
  - Deteriorating letters were removed from the outside wall, and the wall was repainted. A new sign for "Playing to Learn" was designed & painted by Deborah Shanks and made by Jim Lessenger was installed over the entrance way to the CE Building.

### On-going routine maintenance:

- Weed whacking, pruning, palm tree sprout removal, spreading wood chip mulch; wildfire weed control.
- Maintenance of the native plant garden on the upper hillside facing 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, outside the PTL fence. (designed and planted by Chole McGraw).
- Restocking paper, trash bags and cleaning supplies; monitoring of custodial services; cleaning the kitchen/refrigerator; dusting and cobweb removal; cleaning chairs in Fellowship and sanctuary; window cleaning; vacuuming the Sunday School room; cleaning bathrooms on weeks when custodians are not present
- Light bulb and smoke alarm battery changes as needed.
- Replacement of the flutter flag when faded (twice a year). Waterproofing with UV protectant helps prevent the flag from fading.
- Quarterly furnace MERV 11 filter replacement in the sanctuary furnace and CE building furnaces
- Monthly B&G workdays for landscaping and building maintenance.
- Inspection and repairs to the underground drip irrigation system as needed
- Campus litter, garbage (and other) patrol
- Application of vinegar spray (15% vinegar, Dawn, Epson salts) for weed control in the patio, retaining
  walls, rocks and labyrinth areas to control weeds. It is non-toxic. It is not a systemic poison, so touchup reapplication is required (Fall & Spring)
- Preen pre-emergent application in Spring and Fall for control of vetch and other weeds.
- Repairs to the old, original retaining walls along the driveway and street as needed
- Repairs as needed to infrastructure of the church buildings.
- Upkeep and monitoring of security cameras.
- Monitoring for roof leaks and flooding in organ pit.



#### Projects in progress:


- Revisions of the facility use policies, insurance requirements, and the hold harmless statement are in progress.
- Repair/refurbish doors to Fellowship Hall.
- Repair & re-paint the portico outside Fellowship Hall.

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- Install 2 additional picnic tables on the patio.
- Evaluation of wifi controlled thermostats in the Fellowship Hall & Sanctuary.
- Installation of water leakage monitors in the furnace room and the organ pit.
- Fill & seal cracks in driveway.

#### Future projects (2025 and beyond) not yet scheduled:

- Roof replacement of CE Building and Sanctuary 2032 (~\$120,000)
- Replace gutters 2032 (with roof)
- Dig out foundation on east side of CE Building to assess damage to foundation.
- Reseal the parking lot (2027)
- Repair/replacement of the leaking irrigation manifold next to the Fellowship Hall doors.
- Repair/support the wooden sign on the N Street driveway entrance.
- Location and capping of the leak in the labyrinth irrigation zone.
- · Dry rot repair of the CE Building.
- Preparation of a photographic archive of the Green membership book
- Evaluation, excavation & replacement of the underground gutter drainage system on the north side of the CE Building.
- Replace the smaller TV monitor in the sanctuary with larger screen; install audio monitor in ensemble area; re-configure Zoom cameras for new video streaming angle; review sound system
- Repaint the buildings (last done in 2016).
- Roof exhaust fan for sanctuary for Summertime cooling.
- Resurface the 4<sup>th</sup> tier of the parking lot (not done during renovation by Westgate).
- Replace the cement block retaining wall along sidewalk on West 2<sup>nd</sup> Street (when/if it fails).

#### **Christian Education**

Dale Olm

Children go up to the Sunday School room after the Children's Story Sermon in the Worship Service. Currently we are a "One-room Sunday School" for all ages from pre-school up to middle school. There are always at least 2 adults present. On the first Sunday of each month, the children return to the service to participate in Communion.

During November and December, the children practiced singing Away in a Manger and performed the song during the Christmas Concert and participated in the Christmas pageant (see separate committee reports for those events). Our childcare provider, Parand Banagar, assisted the teacher(s) with lessons and helped supervise the pre-school children until she resigned to attend graduate school in Chicago. Kristen Coleman briefly replaced her. After Kristen left, it was decided to pursue hiring a Sunday School teacher to lead classes with assistance by church volunteers. A job description was prepared with anticipating searching for a candidate in 2025.



Attendance varied from 0 to 9, typically 2 to 4 children, with an average of 3.5. Nineteen different children attended during the year, of which 9 children attended regularly, ages 1 to 9 years. Lessons were created from Children's Worship Bulletins (<a href="https://www.childrensbulletins.com">https://www.childrensbulletins.com</a>), the Family Story Bible (Milton), the Lectionary Story Bible (Milton), Growing in God's Love – a Story Bible (Caldwell & Wehrheim), the Complete Children's Liturgy Book (Thompson), Rfour.com and sermons4kids.com, as well as other books and websites.

As requested, we emailed at-home lessons and activities to guardians, parents and grandparents each week prior to Sunday class.

Thank you to adult volunteers Nancy Aldritt, Liz Cleves, Nancy Gilman, Jim Lessenger, Adam Olm, Dale Olm and Marilyn Scrutchins for their assistance in Sunday School and childcare.

Compliance with the new California law, AB506 for child abuse prevention in youth organizations continues to be implemented.

#### Mission and Outreach

This past year the Mission and Outreach Committee had two co-chairs, Lisa Dwiggins and Kathy Berry. The committee's first act was to reaffirm our commitment to Our Church's Greater Mission (OCGM) of a \$5,000 annual pledge. In addition, the committee approved our standard donations of \$400 each to One Great Hour of Sharing, Neighbors in Need and Strengthen the Church.

In late February, our committee started collecting for the Lilies Fund to support foster youth who have aged out of the state system. The funds collected purchased the many basic items needed to set up new apartments. Lisa Dwiggins and Leslie Lessenger did the shopping and used the items to decorate our altar at Easter in lieu of lilies. The items were then delivered to First Place for Youth in Fairfield to be distributed. After much discussion and research, the Mission and Outreach Committee decided to donate \$200 to World Central Kitchen in honor of their volunteers who were killed while volunteering in Gaza during the Israel-Gaza conflict.

In June our church became a sponsor of the Solano Gay Pride event held in Suisun. Our church logo was printed on the event's flyer and we paid for a table so our church members could sit and talk to the event's participants about our welcoming, inclusive church. Pastor Bladimer Paeste, Shelby Riddle, Dale Olm, Nancy Gilman, Billie Casey, Roger Reaber, Leslee Prahl, Jaden Bleasdale and Becks Salentes attended the event.





Even though school had just let out in May, in June the committee started collecting funds for our Back-to-School backpack project to provide basic school supplies for kindergarteners from local low income families. Backpacks were ordered, supplies were donated and at the end of July an assembly line of church members filled each pack. During the second week of August the backpacks were handed out at Steffan Manor Elementary School in Vallejo. Michelle Cavagnuolo was very helpful in getting the list of needed supplies and the distribution date. Pastor Bladimer Paeste, Nancy Gilman, and Kathy Berry handed out the backpacks.

This past fall, Hurricanes Helene and Milton devastated parts of Florida, Georgia, South Carolina and North Carolina. The Northern California Nevada Conference set up a Hurricanes 2024 Appeal. The Mission and Outreach Committee donated \$500 to the appeal together with an additional \$4,550 donated by our generous congregation. September, Lisa Dwiggins stepped down as co-chair and Nancy Gilman stepped in as the new co-chair. Announcements were made in church and in The News from the Pews for our church members to support the Benicia Public Library's winter coat drive.

This year Nancy and Kathy purchased 22 fresh turkeys from Costco and delivered them to the First Baptist Church of Vallejo for their annual community Thanksgiving dinner. On Thanksgiving itself, from 9 am to 11 am, six people from our church volunteered to help carve turkeys, mash potatoes and pack over 200 Thanksgiving dinners for the unhoused and housebound seniors. Those volunteers were Jaden and George Bleasdale, Nora Gauger, Michelle Padilla, Billie Munds and Kathy Berry.

The Mission and Outreach Committee had to find a new charity for our Christmas outreach project as the Family Resource Center of Benicia, who usually gave us a Christmas family to adopt, was closed for

restructuring. After some research, Nancy Gilman found Share the Blessings, a charity in Vallejo serving those in need. As requested, our congregation generously bought toys, pajamas and gift cards. Nancy delivered the items and helped the Blessings people set up for the distribution event.



The committee started collecting for our annual Poinsettia Fund in November. Church members could donate to the fund "in memory of" or "in honor of" someone dear. With the funds collected Nancy and Kathy went shopping for items of warmth for our friends on the street. They



spent \$1,400 on socks, underwear, sweatshirts, ponchos, jackets, hats, gloves, tarps and sleeping bags. The items were placed under the Christmas tree and across the altar for the Sunday, December 22nd service in lieu of poinsettias. Afterwards, the items were given to Vallejo Together to be distributed to the unhoused.



In December the Mission and Outreach Committee donated \$500 to Planned Parenthood of Northern California and \$200 to the Solano Pride Center, worthwhile local charities.

## Worship

What everyone sees and hears on any given Sunday begins weeks before with planning, discussing, and studying by our pastors and the Worship Committee. We had a spirited, spiritual, dedicated group of people this year of 2024 for whom we are grateful. Beginning in January, the team decided on a Lenten theme "What Are You Up To?" All of our themes this year came from a company called Worship Design Studio (WDS) begun by a minister, Marcia McFee. The Worship Committee has used WDS for themes over many years. Our congregation started the Lenten season with an Ash Wednesday potluck dinner, marking our heads with ashes, and watching the movie <u>Up</u> that tied into our theme of What Are You Up To? Decorations for Lent were multiple hot air balloons hung from the ceiling, and a backdrop of hot air balloons.

Other action items and discussions: a Welcome Kit for visitors were discussed. Leslee Prahl then took on the development of a beautiful brochure with information and goodies that is now being handed out to visitors. Thank you, Leslee.

We had an interesting discussion on the use of "you belong here" versus "you are welcome here." Should we change our message to you belong here? Off to council this question went. In the end, we concluded that using the phrase "you are welcome here" was appropriate for us.

The use of song leaders for the first and last songs/hymns of our Sunday services began in March. Thank you to all those involved in helping us sing out.

There was a well attended faith study in March that tied into our Lenten theme.

On Good Friday, a Taizé service was held and that service prompted requests for additional, quarterly Taizé services this year.

From May through August we addressed the following issues.

The congregation said good bye in May to Pastor Renie Kirk after 17 years of leadership and devotion to us. She was honored on her last day in the pulpit and later in the day with a remarkable, fun, but sad party in the afternoon. No other pastor had served us for that length of time. May God bless her,

Pastor Renie informed us that all 17 years of her services are archived on the church computer. Pastor Bladimer brought up the subject of more celebrating together in order to build and deepen relationships and foster feelings of belonging. When Pastor Kim arrived in October she was on board to celebrate more, also, so currently the second Sunday of the month is Celebration Sunday. In addition, Pastor Bladimer would like us to celebrate, dance, laugh, and sing Karaoke outside of Sunday services. In order to improve the flow of the worship services, we will provide bulletins to all participants in the service, have them meet 15 minutes before the services with the pastors, and eventually hold a workshop for all lay participants. No date for instituting the last idea was decided.

In August, Becks Salentas, our new Minister in Discernment, was introduced. She is a student at Pacific School of Religion and will be with working with us for 8 hours a week September through May.

With the presidential election approaching, the committee decided to present another WDS 5 week theme relevant to the divisive attitudes surrounding the election. The theme, "Do Unto Others" was to be presented October 20 through November 17.

The Worship Committee discussed and implemented the following items from **September through December.** 

Becks Salentes began her MID journey with us in September. She will be preaching the last Sunday of each month.

We planned, in detail, our 5 week fall theme of Do Unto Others. Within that theme, each week we addressed different attributes of how to come together through kindness, compassion, humility, respect, and love. Several committee members wrote articles about those attributes in News From The Pews. A visual art effect to show what occurs when opposing views come together was created in the front of the chancel. We hung long strips of red cloth on one side of the cross and blue strips on the other side. Where they overlapped, the color purple was created, a new neutral color, one that we strive to be in a loving world.

In October, we vigorously and warmly welcomed our new co-pastor, Kim Kendrick, as she began her pastorate with us. What a joyous event!

An important but not talked about issue is that of accessibility to the chancel area in front of the sanctuary. Thankfully, it was brought to our attention by Pastor Bladimer. We would need to find a funding source for installing a ramp and the needed remodeling before any plans can be made.
